A Reading for the Week

John 20:11-18

Now Mary stood outside the tomb crying. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb and saw two angels in white, seated where Jesus' body had been, one at the head and the other at the foot. They asked her, "Woman, why are you crying?" "They have taken my Lord away," she said, "and I don't know where they have put him." At this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not realize that it was Jesus. He asked her, "Woman, why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?" Thinking he was the gardener, she said, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him." Jesus said to her, "Mary. "She turned toward him and cried out in Aramaic, "Rabboni!" (which means "Teacher"). Jesus said, "Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.' Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: "I have seen the Lord!" And she told them that he had said these things to her.


Message from Rev Eric Lomax

We could only imagine the hopelessness felt by the disciples when they had witnessed the crucifixion. Out of fear, the Disciples were literally in Lock-down. They had placed themselves behind locked doors out of fear that they would experience the same fate as Jesus. I do not imagine that their company would have been much pleasure really, but I suppose that it could have been worse. It is, in fact, much easier to lock ourselves away than to confront death face to face. Even at the point of Jesus's death, most of them had run away. In fact, apart from the disciple whom Jesus loved, the only ones that stayed with him at the foot of the cross were the women, and it was a woman who on the third day, braved the outside world and made her way to the tomb to anoint his body. The locked room where the disciples hid could, guite frankly, only have been a place of hopeless despair.

Christianity is a strange faith. On Good Friday we spend our time hanging round a man on a cross and on Easter Sunday, around a tomb. It sounds depressing and miserable. Surely, over the last twelve months, we have had enough to deal with during our own lock-down, without making such a big deal of this very strange festival of Easter. We must remember, however, that the festival of the cross and the tomb is, for us, a tremendous festival of hope.

The living God had become flesh so that on Good Friday, he could encounter the abysmal violence of human activity and the depths of human suffering. In this he did not comply with the human assumptions of what God would be. There were no wrathful lightning strikes, or demonstrations of sacred fury. Rather, Jesus, in the name of God, spoke words of forgiveness, hope, and of mending the broken; 'Father forgive them,' he said about the people who had crucified him, 'Beyond this there is heaven,' he implied to those who were crucified next to him, and finally, like the mechanic who can do marvellous things with broken cars, he said; 'It is finished, it is complete, it is mended.'

The disciples, locked in their room did not understand this because like many of us they preferred to sit under a cloud. Although they had heard everything he had said to them for three years, they had not actually heard a single word he had said to them.



In terms of the tomb, Christians hang around there on Easter Sunday because it has a special meaning to them. The woman, who unlike Jesus' male disciples had the courage to step out of lockdown and visit the tomb of Christ, had gone there because anointing a body for burial was an important ritual. She could not have done it on the Saturday because anything like that was forbidden on the Sabbath, so she needed to go early on Sunday morning instead. She took the choice to confront her fears but, instead of finding death, she found an empty tomb with the stone rolled away. It was filled with life and the tomb had, instead, become the womb of new life. Even before the sun had reared its head over the horizon, Jesus had already risen from the dead.

When this woman went back to her brothers she carried with her the message of hope that death would not have the last word and that a genuinely new start was possible because Jesus had defeated death and risen from the grave.

Easter this year will have new meaning to us because for twelve months our Church doors have been locked because of a pandemic. As I write this, the sun is shining brightly outside and we all have a sense that this time of exile is coming to an end. On Easter Sunday morning we will still not be conducting physical public worship but rather, at 11.00am, we will be worshipping on Zoom. Early in the morning I will be carrying the Christ-light into our Church buildings. As light explodes into our places of worship, it is my hope that we will allow the light of the risen Christ into our hearts to transform our lives and our communities. God bless you and have a lovely Easter.

For the Children (& young at heart!)

Did you know?

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- **All about Easter Eggs:** There are lots of eggs at Easter! We can search for hidden eggs, decorate eggs or eat delicious eggs made from chocolate. Christians believe that eggs can help us understand the story of Jesus dying and coming back to life!
- **New Life:** Eggs are a symbol of birth and new life! Christians believe that Jesus was born as a baby on the earth, God in human form. Jesus was sent to be an example for us and to help us to be friends with God.
- What's Inside? Traditional easter eggs are hollow inside. Christians use this as a reminder of the tomb where Jesus was placed after he died. A large stone was placed in front of the tomb. When his friends visited the tomb, the stone had been rolled away and Jesus was gone. Christians believe that Jesus had come back to life. Jesus' friends saw him walking and talking three days after his death, then he went to heaven.
- **A Gift for Everyone:** Christians believe that because Jesus died and came back to life there is hope for everyone. We are all invited to be a friend of God and to one day be with Him in heaven.


