


Message From Rev Eric Lomax

How often do we forget what God has done for us? I see it all the time in churches, when we focus on the superficial, and the meaningless. Churches can lose track all the time by spending time on the structures, the liturgy, the rituals, as if anybody has ever been saved by ritual.

Just look at Judas, you know, Judas Iscariot! People probably do not realise that his name, a Hebrew name, is deeply ironic. It quite literally means 'memories of the Jewish people.' His name was deeply rooted in the past, a past filled with religious tradition. It is only later in the story that we discover that Judas is the betrayer, the one who sold Jesus out to the authorities, but here we see a different side to Judas. Judas was here shown as the pragmatist. He knew the value of stuff.

Reading for the Week John 12, 1-8

¹²Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. ²There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. ³Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. ⁴But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, 5'Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?' 6(He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) ⁷Jesus said, 'Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. ⁸You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me.'

If computers had been a thing in those days Judas would have been a wiz on the old spreadsheet.

He was sat at a table in a household where Lazarus and his sisters had prepared an amazing meal for Jesus. We can only guess why they where there, but then something happens. Mary (not the mother of Jesus!) starts behaving in a way that can only be described as inappropriate. Religious people have very particular ideas about appropriate behaviour. Certainly in the synagogue, and in the church, there were ways that people (particularly women!) should not behave, and this was it. Mary took a bottle of very expensive perfume, and kneeling down at Jesus' feet, she began to mop that perfume all over his feet with her hair

It was Judas who criticised this appalling, sensuous, and wasteful, behaviour. Judas was, in public, a dignified man who knew what was appropriate and what was not appropriate.

'What are you doing woman,' he said, 'That perfume costs a fortune. Why are you wasting it when it could have been sold and the money given to the poor?'

Wow, Judas had assigned his name to charity, giving money to the poor. He knew how to take the moral high ground. The writer then tells us he had no right to take the moral high ground. The Gospel writer tells us that he used to slip himself, from time to time, a few coins from the common purse.

Jesus responded to Judas with modesty; 'You will always have the poor with you, but Mary bought this so that she could keep it for the day of my burial.' Jesus was reminding those present what he was going to do for his people, and indeed for us. He was about to die. The story tells us something else just as important. The clue was sitting in the room with them. Mary and Martha were the sisters of Lazarus, and he was right there in the room with

them. He says nothing in this story, but in the story before, Judas had been in a tomb, dead, for several days. Jesus had wept next to the tomb, not with the crocodile tears of a benevolent benefactor, but with the real tears of a man filled with grief. 'Lazarus come forth,' Jesus had said, and the man whose body was already in the early stages of decomposition, rose up from death and came out of the tomb. Jesus had then said, 'unbind him,' and they had stripped the risen Lazarus of his grave clothes.

Judas had forgotten, probably Martha had forgotten, and even Lazarus himself seemed oblivious to the reasons why Mary was abandoning all her dignity here. Mary was shaming herself for one reason, and one reason alone; gratitude for what Jesus had done for her, her sister and her brother. He had raised Lazarus from the dead.

Christ died on the cross, and he died on the cross for you, and for us. Our places of worship, therefore, should be filled with the sweet perfume of our gratitude, our gratitude for what Jesus has done for us. Amen.

The All Age Bit

In our reading today, Mary's perfume was very expensive, that is why people were so shocked that she gave it to Jesus. But Mary understood how special Jesus was and how precious it was to spend time with Him. Just like Mary's perfume sometimes there is a cost to spending time with Jesus, we might have to give up doing something else that we also enjoy, but time with Jesus is precious and important.

Activities:

Bubble prayers: Open a door or window from your house and send out some prayers into your community. If you have bubble mixture, blow bubbles down the street. Just as the bubbles float down the street, pray that God's peace and comfort would travel out to your neighbours.

Smell challenge: Take it in turns to smell various items whilst wearing a blindfold – can you guess what you are smelling? It could be a nice smell e.g. chocolate, or a not so nice smell e.g. dirty socks. Spend some time wondering what Mary's perfume may have smelt like?
