A short act of worship over a coffee, then unfolding the scriptures together. 7.00pm in St James's Church Barn. Everyone invited.






Message From Rev Eric Lomax

I cannot help but love this passage. I love the way that it is a woman who is given centre stage. Mary is the first to go to the tomb, she is the first to tell the other disciples that the tomb is empty, and she is the one who hangs round and meets the risen Lord. All of these things require an act of faith, and belief in the resurrection is always about an act of faith, and the faith in the resurrection is the faith that even when everything seems lost, God will intervene and bring life out of death, hope out of despair, and peace out of conflict.

There is always the choice when writing something for Holy Week. I have the choice to write about the horror of the cross, or the miracle of resurrection.

Reading for the Week John 20.1-18

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him. Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

As if these were two things completely unrelated to one another. If you go into a Roman Catholic Church you will see a crucifix, a cross with Christ still hanging on it. If, however, you walk into a protestant church you will see a bare wooden cross, with no man on it because Christ has risen from the dead. Both ways of looking at things are right of course. It is important for us to recognise that it was Jesus who was crucified, and it was Jesus who cried out from the cross; 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me. This is important because we have to understand that Jesus was human and experienced all the things we experience including death.

This we must not lose. Because of the death and resurrection of Christ, we do not live in a loveless, hopeless world, but rather we live in a world where hope and love cannot be buried. Join us at Church on Easter Sunday morning to witness for yourself, love rising from the grave.

In the same way it is important to recognise that death and suffering cannot keep a good man down, and Jesus rose from the dead, so on Easter Sunday we don't only see an empty cross, but also an empty tomb. We have to have the story of the cross in the New Testament because if we did not have the story of death, we would not see that Christ has conquered the enemy that nobody else could defeat.

The Roman procurator, Pilate, ended up dead in the tomb, the high priest Caiaphas ended up dead in the tomb, Herod ended up dead in the tomb, Judas Iscariot ended up in the tomb, and even the Jewish temple was raised to the ground by the Romans in AD 70, but the difference between all these and Christ is that Christ is risen from the dead.

Prior to meeting Jesus, Mary had not been the most respected of women, but when she encountered Jesus, she found somebody who, as the son of God, had his father's eyes, and when he looked at her, he loved her unconditionally for what she was. For her, the death of Jesus was the death of love itself. For somebody like Mary, that was the ultimate tragedy.

When Mary went to the tomb to anoint Jesus's body on Easter Sunday morning, this poor tortured woman feared most of all that because Jesus had died, the love she had known in all the time she had followed him, was also buried in the tomb. Jesus is love just as God himself is love. For her, finding the empty tomb was the revelation that love had not died, but rather love was still the most powerful reality in the world.

In my view the story of Mary at the empty tomb is a beautifully written story. She did not recognise him initially, but then when they actually faced each other and he addressed her, she saw those eyes of love looking back at her again. Christ was indeed risen, and love was therefore risen.

Bishop Alan's Easter Message of Joy and Hope

The joyful message of Easter is that God has overcome sin and death and invites us to be people of joy and hope.

Yet this year, we celebrate against the background of bloody conflict in Ukraine and the harrowing pictures of refugees fleeing warfare. It is right that, as a diocese, we are responding to the crisis by collecting and delivering aid, and offering accommodation and hospitality, especially to the refugees arriving at Luton Airport which sits within the diocese.

The situation is all the more tragic because it appears that the war has the unquestioning support of the Russian Orthodox Church – or at least its leadership. When we are tempted to point the finger at others, we need to first examine our own lives; it is right that we reflect whenever our words and deeds deny the very good news we proclaim.

Inevitably, aggression begets aggression and it is likely that some Ukrainian soldiers may have retaliated either out of self-defence or in anger. All acts of aggression and revenge are to be deplored and condemned, whoever commits them.

So this Easter, with dogged defiance we continue to proclaim in faith: Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed!
